BOARD OF EXAMINERS
INSTRUCTIONS TO APPLICANTS
FOR
1976 BAR EXAMINATIONS

1. Application deadlines. The deadline for filing applications for the 1976 Bar Examinations are as follows:

- a. February 1976 Examination. Wednesday, December 24, 1975.
- b. July 1976 Examination. Wednesday, May 26, 1976.

2. Dates and times for examinations. The 1976 Bar Examinations will be held in February and July and will consist of four consecutive sessions on the dates and at the times specified below:

- a. February 1976 Examination: MONDAY, FEBRUARY 23, 1976 TO AND INCLUDING THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 26, 1976, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m.; except on Wednesday, February 25, 1976 for the multistate examination between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:40 p.m. with a lunch break from 12 noon to 1:15 p.m.
- b. July 1976 Examination: MONDAY, JULY 26, 1976 TO AND INCLUDING THURSDAY, JULY 29, 1976, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m.; except on Wednesday, July 28, 1976 for the multistate examination between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:40 p.m. with a lunch break from 12 noon to 1:15 p.m.

This schedule will be strictly adhered to unless otherwise directed by the Supreme Court.

3. Place. Unless otherwise directed, the examination will be held in the meeting rooms at the Blaisdell Memorial Center, with those typing for the nonmultistate examination segregated as the Clerk of the Supreme Court shall direct.

4. Time to Report. Unless otherwise directed, all applicants will report to the place of examination no later than 8:15 a.m. each morning during the examinations.

5. Subjects of Examination. Applicants will be examined on the following subjects:

a. Multistate Examination:

1. Torts
2. Contracts
3. Criminal Law
4. Real Property
5. Evidence
6. Constitutional Law

b. Essay Questions:

1. Business Organization (including corporations, partnerships and agencies)
2. Wills and Trusts
3. Civil Procedure and Legal Ethics
4. Uniform Commercial Code (limited to Sales, Commercial Paper and Secured Transactions)

(The essay questions will also include one question in each of the multistate examination subjects.)

IMPORTANT NOTICE: For purpose of the examination on the Hawaii Rules of Civil Procedure and the Uniform Commercial Code only, copies of the Rules and of the Code will be furnished to each applicant at the time of the examination for use during the examination. Following the examination, all copies of the materials furnished shall be returned unmarked.

No other books, notes or materials will be permitted in the examination room. Any violation of this requirement shall result in disciplinary action.

6. Examination Materials and Answers.

a. Multistate Examination.

All materials will be furnished by the Clerk of the Supreme Court. The correct response for evidence questions will be the best answer under both the Federal Rule of Evidence and general evidence law.

b. Essay Examination.

Answers must be written in black ball point pen only or typed. Writing and typing paper will be supplied by the Clerk of the Supreme Court. Applicants will furnish their own pens. No answers written in pencil or in pen in other colors of ink will be graded. Applicants should inform the Clerk of the Supreme Court as to whether they will be writing or typing the examination when filing their applications. Applicants desiring to type the examination may do so upon providing their own typewriters and arranging for the use of the same with the Clerk of the Supreme Court prior to February 6, 1976 for the February examination and prior to July 9, 1976 for the July examination.


Your answer to a question should demonstrate your ability to analyze the facts presented by the question, to select the material from the immaterial facts, and to discern the points upon which the case turns. It should show your knowledge and understanding of the pertinent principles and theories of law, their relationship to each other, and their qualifications and limitations. It should evidence your ability to apply the law to the facts given, and to reason logically in a lawyer-like manner to a sound conclusion from the premises adopted. Try to demonstrate your proficiency in using and applying legal principles rather than a mere memory of them.

An answer containing only a statement of your conclusions will receive little credit. State fully the reasons which support them. All points should be thoroughly discussed. Although your answer should be complete, you should not volunteer information or discuss legal doctrines which are not necessary or pertinent to the solution of the problem.

Unless a question expressly asks for Hawaii Law, it should be answered according to legal theories and principles of general application.

7. Invitation to Orientation Meeting. Applicants are invited to orientation meetings scheduled to be held in the Supreme Court courtroom at 2:00 p.m., on Friday, February 13, 1976 for the February examination and on Friday, July 9, 1976 for the July examination at which times pertinent information will be disseminated as the Bar examinations. Applicants will be allowed to ask questions for purpose of clarification. This invitation to attend is purely voluntary.
