SOME MILESTONES OF THE SCHOOL OF LAW

1973 - 1983

- 1973 On September 4, before a small complex of grey wooden buildings, fifty-three prospective students of law stand with six pioneering law faculty and four administrators to hear Lieutenant Governor George Ariyoshi and Chief Justice William Richardson welcome them as the first class of the new University of Hawaii School of Law.
- 1974 Provisional accreditation is received from the American Bar Association. The Hawaii Bar Association/Law School Liaison Committee is established. The Pre-Admission to Law School Program is founded and twelve students are admitted to this affirmative action program.
- 1975 The Law curriculum is developed to include student externships as well as ocean and environmental law courses. The Law Library's collection reaches 90,000 volumes. The Legal Assistant Program is founded at Kapiolani Community College with the help and technical assistance of the Law School.
- 1976 The first class of the School of Law graduates in May. A major expansion and renovation of the Law School's temporary plant in the "Quarry" provides additional classrooms and seminar areas as well as needed office space.
- 1977 The Law School continues to expand both the physical amenities of the temporary Law School site as well as the curriculum. Forty percent of the student body is composed of women this year. A dual degree program is established with the School of Business Administration. The Dean's Scholastic Award, the first academic prize at the School, providing a year's books and tuition for two law students, is established by Michael P. and Janice K. Porter. The Hawaii Institute of Continuing Legal Education is founded with the support of the Law School.
- 1978 Expanded clinical program begins development. The President of the Hawaii Bar invites the Dean of the School of Law to meet regularly with the Executive Board of the Hawaii Bar Association. The Student Placement Office is established. A five-person library staff works with the growing collection of 125,000 volumes.
- 1979 The University of Hawaii Law Review is founded, and editors begin preparation of the first issue. The design stage of the proposed Law School Complex is underway. The Richardson Inn of Phi Delta Phi, the oldest and largest national legal fraternity is founded.
- 1980 Alumni of the School now constitute over 10% of the Hawaii Bar. The first issue of the University of Hawaii Law Review is published. Plans for the new Law School Complex are approved.
- 1981 Ground is broken for the new Law Library on March 2. The School of Law fields its first team for the National Moot Court Competition. The Law of the Sea Institute became formally affiliated with the Law School.
- 1982 The School of Law is awarded full American Bar Association approval. The School's Moot Court Team's brief places third of fourteen in the Western Regional Competition. Ground is broken for the new Law Classroom and Office Building on March 9.
- 1983 In January, the new Law Library opens and the School is officially named the William S. Richardson School of Law. The Classroom and Office Building is dedicated in July. The School receives its first endowed chair, the Wallace S. Fujiyama Distinguished Visiting Professor of Law. With the entry to the Hawaii Bar of the Class of 1983, nearly 500 graduates of the School of Law will be in law-related positions in the State.
